Like the Cordillern Flacathchers from Colorado, the Mt. Lemmon birds travel to centeral mexico for the winter and are found in riparian areas from Acapulco to Mexico City and south to Chipas, MX.



Charles continues as an Emeritus ST Research Ecologist with the USGS, and in August attended a virtual AOS meeting and later that month a virtual Wildlife Disease meeting. In between his research projects, he helps Jacque in the shop and Kim with her garden sales. This past fall over Thanksgiving, Charles went hunting with Kimberly, Keo and Kale for bull elk in northern Arizona, and they all brought home some fine elk meat for the upcoming year. 

Sandy looks for him, he is out in the greenhouse or garden.












